1. 授業題目:

Selected Topics in Modern and Contemporary Japanese Literature and Manga

2. Course Title (授業題目):

Selected Topics in Modern and Contemporary Japanese Literature and Manga

3. 授業の目的と概要 (Course Objectives and Course Description):

In this course, through our encounter with various literary texts and literary voices, we reflect on Japan's cultural, social, and political milieu from the 1960s to the present. In particular, we will reflect on issues including the evolving interaction between Japanese tradition and modernity; the interplay of individualism and the institutions of authority and control; and the intersection of "literary" and "popular" fiction; and the representations of gender and ethnicity. We will also explore different literary genres and study the key literary movements and their legacy. Lectures will provide historical and cultural background for the works under discussion, while sections will allow students to discuss the works in depth.

The topics that we will explore in class include technology and robots, $sh\bar{o}j\bar{o}$ (young girl) culture, urban margins, and the 3/11 nuclear disaster in Tōhōku region.

Note: Before the first class on July 15 (Tuesday), students will have to read the manga excerpts of Tezuka Osamu's *Astro Boy and* excerpts of Scott McCloud's *Understanding Comics* (1993).

4. 学習の到達目標 (Learning Goals):

In addition to regular attendance and participation in class discussions, students will demonstrate mastery of basic facts and concepts about modern and contemporary cultural history from the 1960s to the present. Students will also analyze selected literary texts in carefully-argued and clearly-written essays. *Students are required to submit a 4-5 page long essay for the final projects*.

5. 授業の内容・方法と進度予定 (Course Content, Methods, and Course Schedule):

There will be four sessions on **July 15 (Tue)**, **16 (Wed)**, **17 (Thur)**, **and 18 (Fri)**, **2025**. Each session will be three hours long, from 13:00 to 16:10, with a short break in the middle.

6. 成績評価方法 (Grading):

7. 教科書および参考書 (Materials):

We will read all works in English translation; no formal background in Japanese studies or Japanese language is required or expected, although such background will likely prove helpful. There are no required texts to purchase, and all course materials will be provided by the instructor.

8. 授業時間外学習 (Out-of-hours learning):

Students will have to read the manga excerpts of Tezuka Osamu's *Astro Boy and* excerpts of Scott McCloud's *Understanding Comics* (1993). Students are expected to spend 1 to 3 hours on the readings for each session.
